The Philippine Eagle is one of the rarest birds in the world and is found only in the Philippines. Fewer than 400 breeding pairs remain, and many are now closely related, which can make the species weaker over time. At the same time, they continue to face threats like forest loss and hunting, putting them at serious risk of extinction.

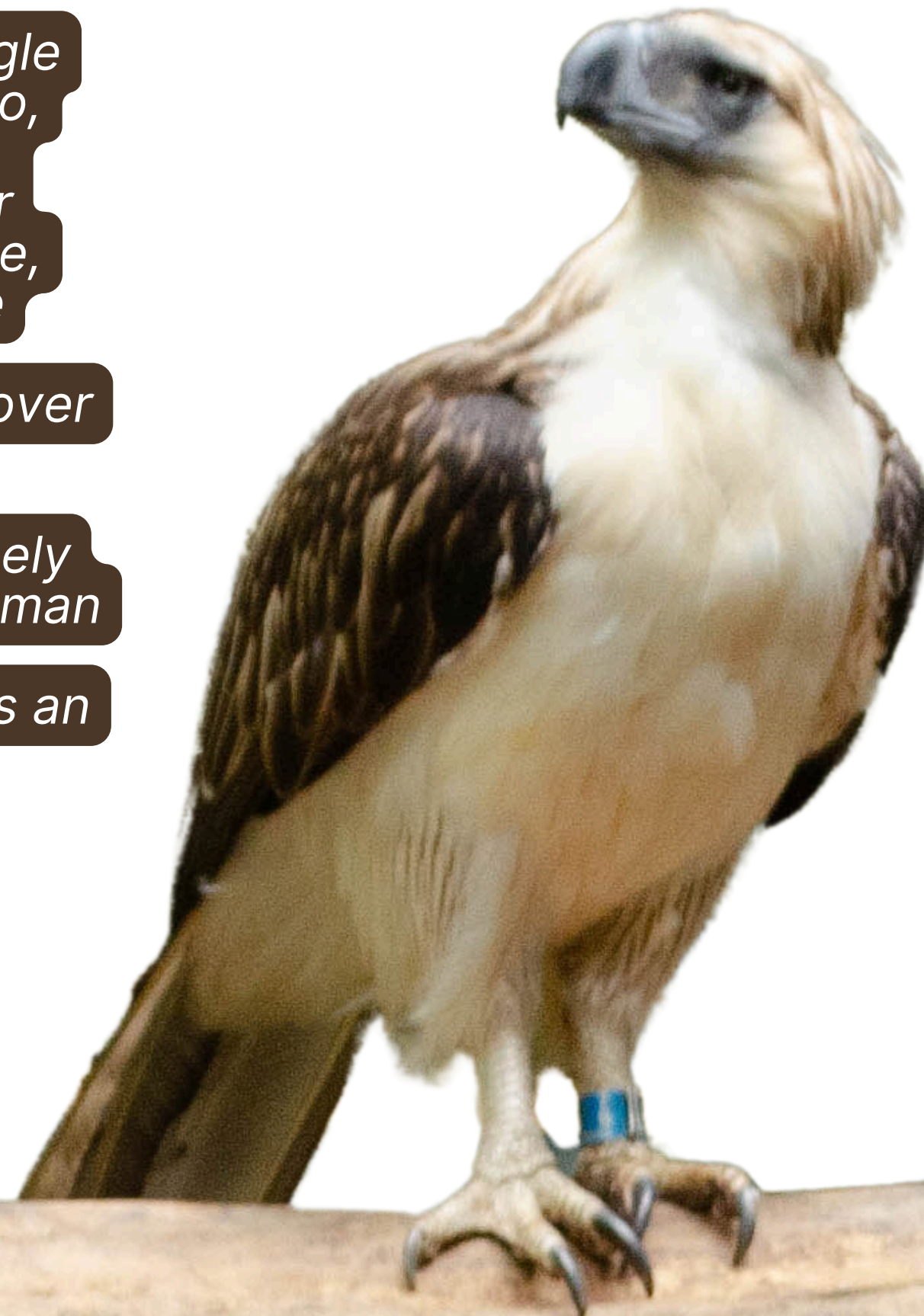
That's why conservation breeding is so important. By helping eagles reproduce in human care—such as inseminating females with sperm from males in different areas—we can create healthier, stronger young eagles. This helps rebuild their genetic strength and gives the species a better chance to survive and return to the wild.

# MEET AGSAMON

## AGSAMON'S STORY: A FUTURE MOTHER FOR THE PHILIPPINE EAGLE

*Agsamon is a female Philippine Eagle rescued in 2021 from San Fernando, Bukidnon. She was only about two months old when a hunter took her from her nest. Weak and vulnerable, she was brought to the care of the Philippine Eagle Center, where dedicated keepers helped her recover and grow strong.*

*Because Agsamon was raised closely by people, she became used to human care. This means she cannot be released into the wild—but she has an equally important role to play.*

# MEET AGSAMON

## AGSAMON'S STORY: A FUTURE MOTHER FOR THE PHILIPPINE EAGLE



*What makes Agsamon especially valuable is her unique bloodline from the Pantaron Range in Bukidnon. By inseminating her with sperm from males from different areas, we can produce young eagles with stronger, more diverse genetics.*

*This is very important because there are so few Philippine Eagles left in the wild.*

*When we carefully mix different family lines:*

- ***The young eagles are healthier and stronger***
- ***The population becomes more resilient***
- ***The risk of genetic problems is reduced***

*In time, these young eagles can be released back into the forest—helping restore the population of this critically endangered species.*

***Agsamon may not return to the wild—but through her, many others will.***

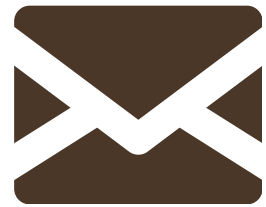
